Civil Rights Discussion grants are available to create an Open & Honest event.

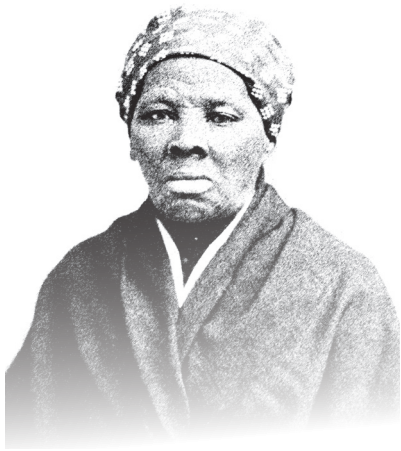
Applications are accepted bimonthly and grant funds books, photocopying, facilitator honorarium, equipment rental, and publicity.

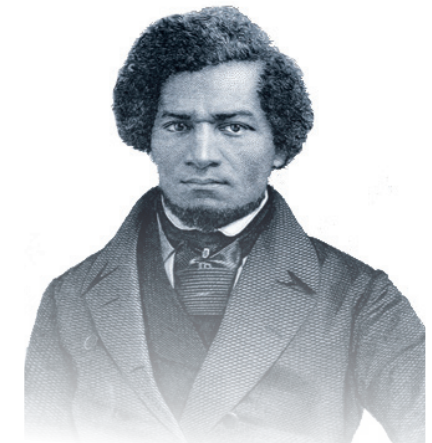
Scenes from a recent Reading Frederick Douglass event at the State House
