### Frederick Douglass in Lynn

(born c. February 1818 – February 20, 1895)

Born as Frederick Augustus Washington Bailey, he became the great Frederick Douglass during his time in Lynn.

Douglass was hired as an Anti-Slavery Society Agent in August 1841 and delivered his first official recorded speech to an anti-slavery meeting in Lynn, Massachusetts in early October 1841. He also moved his family to Lynn at that time.

During Douglass' time in Lynn he delivered over a thousand speeches, traveling by train from Lynn to meetings all over what was the "free" North. He fought "Jim Crow" segregated train cars and won during that time.

Douglass developed into a great orator and intellectual speaker, so much so that there was skepticism as to whether he had ever really been a slave.

Douglass answered the skepticism by writing his "Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass" which detailed his beginnings on the eastern shore of Maryland to his arrival in New Bedford, Massachusetts.

Douglass wrote the book during the winter of 1844-1845. When he finished it he signed the last page with "Lynn, Mass., April 28, 1845".
